There are no Regents exams on this day, as the Board of Regents is recognizing Juneteenth, a new state holiday that commemorates the emancipation of enslaved people in the United States. Juneteenth officially falls on June 19th, which is a Saturday this year. This state holiday will be observed each year going forward.

### **Student Promotes Mental Health Awareness**



The pandemic has been difficult for us all, but Spackenkill High School sophomore Nordelís Vega has found a way to make some good come out of it. Over the summer of 2020, she came up with the idea for the Dutchess County Council of Teens, consisting of representatives from local high schools.

The thinking behind the council was to provide a way for teens to share ideas and give them a voice in the community—something that Nordelís strongly felt was lacking, especially as schools went remote during pandemic times. The council also serves as the project for her Girl Scout Gold Award. Her advisor for the award is Senator Sue Serino.

The council voted to make their focus "mental health" this year and organized a panel with two mental health professionals. "We are hoping to share it with schools that are part of the council," says Nordelís. The group also conducted a mental health survey and received 1,300 responses. Seventy-four percent of respondents said their mental health had been affected by the pandemic.

To keep your spirits up, Nordelís recommends finding things you enjoy doing. "Take time for yourself. During finals, take five minutes to decompress and take your mind off of things. Walk away, talk to your friends and people you're comfortable with, don't keep things inside."

Over the past few months, Nordelís has been in the community spreading the word. This past week, she met with County Executive Marc Molinaro and presented her ideas to the County Legislature for Mental Health Awareness Month.

At Spackenkill, Nordelís is a member of the crew team and Spack Onstage. Congratulations on this exciting project.

#### **Student Assists Deaf Community**




Spackenkill High School junior Maya Joy organized an online event last week attended by 21 people from the deaf, hard of hearing, and hearing communities. The event was hosted by Taconic Resources for Independence, which also provided American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters.

"We're all here today to discuss important information and answer any questions that you might all have about important issues that are going on with COVID," said Maya to the group. She then introduced Dr. Valerie Cluzet, an infectious disease specialist from Nuvance Health, affiliated with Vassar Brothers in Poughkeepsie. John Nelson, also of Vassar Brothers/Nuvance, joined in the discussion.

In addition to general COVID questions, helpful topics came up such as how interpreters are being scheduled at vaccine sites and how the deaf let the staff know at registration that they need communication access to interpreters.

Members of the Todd ASL Club attended the event as well to practice their sign language skills.




#### Global Gallery Walk at SHS
